Over the past thirteen years, nearly **150 young parents** raising their children in poverty received academic education, job training, child care, parenting classes, nutrition classes and a valuable support system through the **Families Learning Together program** at **The Family Place**. According to a 2013 survey, **six out of seven** Families Learning Together participants reported feeling greatly increased confidence in their parenting skills after a year at **The Family Place**.

THE FAMILY PLACE OFFERS HOPE AND PRACTICAL HELP

SERVICES FOR PARENTS & CHILDREN

CIS - Early Intervention: Home visits for children ages 0-3 who experience, or are at risk of, developmental delays. The Family Place staff provide therapy within the child's home, and assist with the transition to school-based services when the child turns three.

Playgroups: Children ages 0-5 and caregivers gather for socializing at our playground and in our playroom. A staff person is always present to answer questions, offer resources, support and relationship building through play.

CIS - Nursing and Family Support: Home visits for families in need of education and support to foster positive parenting practices and healthy habits, including safe sleep and good nutrition.

Families Learning Together (FLT): A skills-based program designed to enable young, impoverished parents to reach their education and employment goals while learning to establish strong, positive relationships with their children.

Welcome Baby Bags:

Information for new parents about newborn care, postpartum care, feeding and sleeping, plus resources to contact when you have questions. Also included in the bag is a new book for your baby! Child Advocacy Center - Child / Family Counseling and

Support: The CAC serves children ages 3 to 18 who have made a disclosure of child sexual abuse. Services include case management, therapy, assistance obtaining victims' compensation and relief from abuse orders when needed, coordinating medical exams, and referral to other programs, services, and agencies. The CAC also serves adults who choose this site to disclose information about their experiences with sexual abuse.

Child Care Center: The Family Place Child Care Center is a 4 STAR center that offers care primarily to the children of parents in our Families Learning Together program. Children ages 0-3 spend their days in an emotionally nurturing, developmentally appropriate setting. The Center is also a learning site for participants in our FLT program, where they gain firsthand knowledge about child development and their own roles in raising happy, healthy children

THROUGH THESE INNOVATIVE PROGRAMS:

SERVICES FOR PARENTS

Parent Education: Workshops, lectures and programs for parents who want to enrich their relationships with their young children and build a strong foundation for future success.

Child Care Financial

Assistance: Financial support for low-income Vermont families who need assistance paying for quality child care while parents are working, looking for work, or continuing their education.

Reach Up: Reach Up helps young families with children by providing services that support work and cash assistance for basic necessities. Parents involved in Reach Up are usually younger than 24 years old and have one or more children living with them.

SERVICES FOR ADULT & CHILD VICTIMS OF SEXUAL ABUSE

Special Investigative Unit and Child Advocacy Center: A

multi-disciplinary team that focuses specifically on the investigation, prosecution and victim services for all sexually based offenses against children and adults, as well as serious child abuse.

LOOKING BACK AT A YEAR OF PROMISE & FULFILLMENT

This year's annual "Force for the Future" Policy Event featured Linda Mason as our keynote speaker. Linda presented to nearly 100 attendees from local businesses, members of the Vermont Parent Child Center Network, members of other area nonprofits and committed individuals. She spoke of her experiences confronting poverty both in the United States and around the world. Her work with Bright Horizons and Horizons for Homeless Children in the Boston area provide both inspiration and a template for all of us to apply our energy and time toward improving the lives of children and families in our own neighborhoods.

The Family Place Child Advocacy Center (CAC) successfully completed their reaccreditation in November. Members of the National Children's Alliance conducted a site visit and concluded that The Family Place CAC was meeting and exceding all standards of evaluation and providing stellar support for families. One evaluator said, "This is a strong team and umbrella organization that works well in this community. This would be a good mentor program for other centers..."

Between the years 2000 and 2013, nearly **700 families** were supported by The Family Place Child Advocacy Center while their children were interviewed by CAC and SIU staff in relation to allegations of childhood sexual or physical abuse.

MADE POSSIBLE BY OUR GENEROUS SUPPORTERS

In November of 2012, The Family Place was approved by the Vermont Agency of Education as a licensed **Teen Parent Education Program**, and we began offering high school classes for credit toward graduation from participating local high schools. During 2013, we offered English, Mathematics, Area Studies, Biology, Physical Education and Health, along with parenting, life skill classes and other electives to our FLT participants. Eight young adults took classes during the 2012-2013 school year, and one young mother managed to accrue enough credits to graduate!

"The academic component of the FLT program allows our participants to work toward completing their high school diplomas within the circle of nurturing support that The Family Place provides," explains Christopher Ashley, the TFP academic liason for the FLT program. "Their degree is an important step as they work to become self sufficient and independent citizens, and parents of children who have a real chance to succeed in our world."

In the fall of 2012, The Family Place initiated participation in the **Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP)**. Through CACFP, we serve breakfast, lunch and snack to the 16 children in our Child Care Program, 4 days a week. This federally funded program allows children from low-income families to get the regular nutrition they need to grow and thrive.

A New Way of Seeing the World

REACH UP SUCCESS



Through Reach Up, April is able to provide

For the past two years, April has been involved with Reach Up through The Family Place. Reach Up made it possible for her to afford basic necessities for her children while she went back to school. It's also changed her life in ways she never expected.

Reach Up is a critical support for many young parents. A state funded program, it helps by providing services that support work and offering cash assistance for basic necessities. For many families it's a crucial step towards independence.

For April, the bimonthly payments are coming to an end this month because her partner is now employed and earning enough for him, April, and their two children to live on. Before that, Reach Up was necessary to help April buy baby diapers, wipes, "Whatever I needed."

her children with basic necessities. "It's a scary thing," April says. "It's a good thing, but it's really stressful, too. We're going to have to manage with just his paychecks."

This 23-year-old Mom is no stranger to stress and hard times. Three years ago, soon after she gave birth to her son, Eli, she and her partner lost their apartment and had to move amongst friends and relatives - whoever let them stay over for a night or two. "We both tried so hard to get a job, but everything kept falling apart," she says. Two years ago, when she was pregnant with her second child, April decided something had to change. She found Reach Up and became connected to The Family Place for support services.

"I thought, great, all I'll have to do is focus on raising my kids, and that's enough of a job," April laughs. "But my case manager, Hoyt, told me 'no, you need to get a job, do community service, or come to school.' So I came to Families Learning Together and now I'm earning my high school diploma." While April attends classes, her children spend their days in the developmentally nurturing environment of The Family Place Child Care Center.

"Hoyt is tough, but in a good way," April says. "She really opens your eyes to look at things in a different way. That's exactly what I needed. She made me see I have to do something with my life so I can raise my kids the right way. She believed in us as a family."

Because of the Reach Up program at The Family Place, April and her family were able to survive a few tough years, and emerged from a hard time stronger than before and better prepared to take on the job of being the best parents they can be.

HAYDEN SAYS "MAMA!"

EARLY INTERVENTION SUCCESS

When a child receiving Early Intervention (EI) services makes a breakthrough, it's cause for joyful celebration. And not just for the parents.

"Both Jennie and I started to cheer!" says The Family Place's Speech-Language Pathologist, Sarah Schneider. She's referring to the day one of her EI clients called up and had her 3-year-old son speak to Sarah on the phone. "One of our first goals for Hayden was for him to say 'Mama.' We worked hard to get Hayden to say it either in a therapy session or just in his daily life. One day I was at my desk and Jennie called, filled with excitement. She said 'Hold on, Hayden has something he wants to say.' He got on the phone and started saying, 'Mama! Mama! Mama! That was a wonderful feeling."

Hayden is Jennie's second child. Her daughter, Nora, was born with a hearing impairment and also needed speech therapy from The Family Place. Hayden has normal hearing, but when he was a year and a half old, Jennie noticed that he had far fewer words than other children his age. While she and her husband could mostly understand Hayden's needs, people outside the family could not.

"Our pediatrician said it was a good idea to check with The Family Place," says Jennie. "So Sarah started coming, and she came right to his level and played games with him, talked to him, played with him, and he made huge strides. Now he's talking up a storm." Hayden was three years old when he first began to say "Mama," and he still needs help pronouncing words correctly. Speech

therapy has given him a strong foundation of language on which to build, and, best of all, he finds it fun to work at his vocabulary.

Part of what has made Hayden's speech therapy so successful may have been the use of sign language, which was already established in their home because of their daughter's hearing. "He loves to do signs, and they help us understand what he needs," Jennie says. "Nora loves working with him on the alphabet!"

Jennie and her husband were hesitant at first to embark on speech therapy with their son, but hearing her son say that magic word, Mama, was the best result they could've hoped for.

"That phone call made me smile for the rest of the day," says Sarah.

"We wondered, does he really need speech therapy? But of course you want to give your child any help they can get, so for me it was yes."

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We also want to recognize the staff of The Family Place, who not only perform their work with great energy and outlook, but who also contribute an extra large dose of time and effort to our annual Gingerbread Festival!

At times our own light goes out and is rekindled by a spark from another person. Each of us has cause to think with deep gratitude of those who have lighted the flame within us.


