

Language Development in Toddlers

All parents wait – often impatiently – for their child's first word. Will it be Mama? Dada? Ball? Whatever it turns out to be, it's a major milestone to be recorded and shared with family and friends.

Some children, though, experience a delayed start to speaking; their first few words aren't followed by increasingly regular conversation, or parents might notice that other adults can't understand the majority of their child's words, even if mom and dad know exactly what their child means.

There are several causes for speech delay. If a child's hearing registers below normal levels - either because of fluid buildup or birth defect - that could lead to delayed speech. Certain developmental issues or illnesses may also be the cause of speech delay. And, as speech therapist Sarah Schneider points out, "Sometimes mom and dad are so good at anticipating what the child wants that the child never has to say the word."

There's plenty of variation in the progress towards speech, but the general guidelines indicate:


- ~ children usually speak their first word between 10-13 months
- ~ by 18 months children have about 15 words
- ~ by age 2 children use about 50 words
- ~ by age 4 they are on their way to 1000 words

Schneider also points out that intelligibility is important to gauge as well;

- ~ children of 18 months should be able to be understood by someone other than their caregivers at least 25% of the time
- $\sim$  19-24 month olds should be understood 25-50% of the time
- ~ at 36 months old a child should be clear about 80% of the time

However, language development can vary widely; guidelines aren't meant to make parents panic, but they provide a useful way to determine the questions you might want to ask your pediatrician.
